Accessible Voting Information

With the federal election approaching, it is important to be aware of the measures in place that can making voting a more accessible experience. Providing assistance to voters ensures that all voters have equal opportunity to participate in Australia's democracy. A requirement for assistance does not affect your right to vote.

The date of the election is at the time of writing, unknown, however will occur on or before 17th May 2025. The **last day** to enrol or change your details will be approximately one week after the election is announced. The exact dates will be available via the AEC once the election is announced. You can check your details now at https://check.aec.gov.au/

Voting in person

Each polling place has an accessibility rating. These ratings are: wheelchair accessible, assisted wheelchair access, and not wheelchair accessible. You can find how your local polling places are rated here on the AEC website once the election is announced, or by contacting the AEC.

You may receive assistance to vote at a polling place. You may nominate any person to assist you to vote. If you do not nominate someone polling staff are able to provide assistance. If you cannot get out of the car and the polling official in charge is satisfied that you cannot enter the polling place, someone may bring the ballot papers to you.

Early voting at polling places is also available. People with disability and their carers are eligible to vote early. Early voting commences two weeks before election day. Early voting centres will be published on the AEC website after the election is announced.

Postal and Phone Voting

Postal voting is available to those who are unable to attend a polling place to vote. If you have a disability or mobility restrictions, you may be eligible to become a general postal voter. This means you will be able to receive ballot papers in the post for each federal election without having to reapply each time.

Postal votes will open shortly after the election is announced and must be sent by 6pm on election day. Postal votes must be received by the AEC no later than 13 days after election day.

Telephone voting is also available for voters who are blind or have low vision. Mobile voting is available in some locations for occupants of hospitals or assisted care facilities.

Services Assistance

There are many services and opportunities available from government and community that may be of interest to you after Stroke. You may not be aware of these services or that you meet their eligibility requirements. Below is a list of key services that may be of assistance to you. You can also contact your local council as they often provide an array of useful services specific to your local community.

Companion Card

The companion card program is available for people with significant and permanent disability who need a high level of care in the community. It allows a cardholder's support person free entry into participating venues and events. The card is not issued to all people with disability, but to those who can demonstrate that they can't participate at most venues and activities without a companion, and that this need is lifelong. The card is not means tested. If you are eligible you will have the card for life. Information for application can be found on the Service NSW website; www.service.nsw.gov.au

Taxi Transport Subsidy Scheme

The Taxi Transport Subsidy Scheme supports NSW residents who are unable to use public transport because of a severe and permanent disability. If you're eligible, you could receive a subsidy of 50% of a taxi fare, up to a maximum subsidy of \$60 per trip, and only pay the remaining fare. This includes travel in wheelchair-accessible taxis. Sydney Water

If you receive a pension from Services Australia or the Department of Veterans' Affairs, you may be entitled to a discount on fixed service charges on your water bill. Generally, the rebate applies to the person whose name is on the property title deed. However, some non-homeowners may also be eligible.

Sydney Water's PlumbAssist service helps people experiencing financial difficulties deal with issues such as: finding and repairing hidden leaks. To be eligible: the property must have an individual Sydney Water meter. Mobility Parking Permit

You may not realise that you are eligible for a mobility parking permit. If you have a medical condition or disability that affects your walking or vision, two key areas affected after Stroke, you may be eligible. The permit lets you park in disability parking spaces and access certain parking concessions. You can apply for the permit yourself or ask someone you know to apply on your behalf. For an individual or temporary permit, apply online, download an application form, or get one from a service centre. Applications are completed by your GP and lodged with Service NSW. Vision Impaired Person's travel pass


If you're severely vision impaired, you can apply for a Vision Impaired Person's (VIP) Travel Pass. The VIP Travel Pass entitles you to free (or concession) travel on public transport in NSW. Your attendant can travel with you for free if your VIP Travel Pass is marked "Plus Attendant". Eligibility requirements and application details are available on the Service NSW website. www.service.nsw.gov.au

Seniors Card and Senior Savers Card

The NSW Seniors Card and Senior Savers Card are for NSW permanent residents over the age of 60 to receive discounted products and services. Seniors Cards are for those averaging 20 hours or less of paid work a week across a 12-month period, whilst Senior Savers Cards are for those averaging more than 20 hours of paid work a week across a 12-month period. Both types of card holders are eligible for discounted products and services, however only Seniors Card holders are eligible for a gold opal card. www.service.nsw.gov.au


